Destination: Innovation Equipping Teachers to Transform Learning

Introduction

But progress can't stop here. Nor can the district rest on its accomplishments. The world is changing rapidly, and the district must anticipate the needs of the future before they become reality. Our Vision for the Future

The vision of Forest Hills Public Schools is to create a new model of education which equips each student with the 21st-century skills they need to be successful. What does that mean?

- Achieving objectives. There is still a set of core educational standards that must be mastered in order for a student to graduate. There's also a set of best practices that have been proven to work. These two elements must be part of the vision for the future.
- Project-based learning. Students will still need to learn facts and theories. But rather than spending each day in 5-7 discrete "hours" of subject matter lectures, students will also apply their knowledge to projects and modern-day problems that require integrated skills from many different subject areas.
- Mass customization. Teachers need a a sophisticated analysis tool to know exactly which ideas or concepts have been mastered by each student. Then they need to customize a learning plan for each one. Technology must play a central role in evaluating, tracking and charting student progress so that teachers can customize the learning experience for each student in real time.
- Advanced training. Just as it takes time for students to learn to work collaboratively, it also takes time and practice for teachers to deliver content this way. The system cannot change if teachers are not given the opportunity to make it work.

This is exciting, fulfilling, and leading-edge work. However, it bears a much stronger resemblance to research and development than it does to traditional education. The district must seek out hypotheses about how to help students learn more effectively, just as if they were running a massive laboratory. They must implement those ideas, track the measurements, and then evaluate the results.

This is not a case of simply "building a better mousetrap." It is a case of innovating solutions that will propel Forest Hills students to a lifetime of success.

The Role of the Foundation

True innovation means to create something new; something that does not yet exist. Significant innovation requires research and development, which in turn requires funding. Companies such as Apple, Microsoft and Google, who are known for their innovative excellence, spend billions each year on R&D.

Forest Hills Public Schools does not have an Apple budget. Innovation requires investment on a scale that can't be drawn from general operating funds. If Forest Hills truly wants to maintain its leadership position in the decades to come, then the community must step up and invest in the future success of students and the district.

The Forest HIIIs Public Schools Foundation has an important role in all of this. Their job is to attract investment funds that create opportunities for innovation. The Foundation will provide the capital needed to fund the research and development of innovations that can lead to new levels of excellence. Once those innovations have been tested and proven, the Foundation can then provide the funds to scale them to the entire district.

To this end, the Foundation is embarking upon a \$500,000 "Destination: Innovation" advancement campaign that will fund exploration of new learning methods, structures and ideas.
